#### The School

Deerfield Academy was chartered in 1797 to serve the local population of a rural village in Western Massachusetts. Since the 1920s, it has been wholly independent and committed to excellence in a full liberal arts curriculum and wholesome community life for young people from throughout the United States and around the world in grades nine through postgraduate. Deerfield's Core Values include citizenship, face-to-face interactions, connectedness, reflection and balance, pursuit of mastery, and shared experiences.

#### Enrollment

The 2023-24 enrollment of 653 students includes 73 day students and 580 boarding students from 32 states and the District of Columbia, and 42 foreign countries represented; 35% are domestic students of color and 11% are international. There are 204 seniors in the class of 2024. There are 150 members of the faculty.

#### Cocurricular Activities

Each student spends approximately two hours every weekday afternoon in a required faculty-supervised activity. For most students, this is an athletic commitment at the varsity, junior varsity, or recreational level. For others, this time is spent in dance classes or theater rehearsals or pursuing volunteer work through our community service program. A few students receive permission to engage in special projects in art, music, or an academic field.

#### Academic Calendar

Deerfield uses a trimester calendar and, as such, we do not have typical first quarter or midyear grades. Fall Term grades are available after Thanksgiving. Colleges will receive Fall Term grades for all senior applicants and those should be used as a student's "midyear" grades.

Starting with the 2021-2022 academic year to present, Deerfield adopted a six-period rotating block schedule that features three 90-minute classes per day.

# Academic Program#

Deerfield students engage in five seminar-style classes (average size: 12 students) each term; many classes are year-long, while others are one- or two-trimester electives. In some cases, an advanced student may be granted permission to take a sixth graded class. Any student can choose to take a fine or performing arts course as a sixth pass/fail class.

Academic work at Deerfield is evaluated on a numerical scale (0-100) where the minimum passing grade is 60 and the median grades are generally between 85 and 90. Qualifying cumulative grade averages for the term of 93.0 or above garner High Honors distinction and 90.0 or above garner Honors distinction. **One hundred percent of our graduates ultimately attend four-year colleges and universities.** 

#### Curriculum

All of Deerfield's courses should be viewed as challenging and college preparatory. Many classes use college level texts and match the pace of an undergraduate college course; others are post-AP level and the Honors or AP-course is the prerequisite. Over the past three years, Deerfield has moved away from teaching AP courses, and we currently only offer official AP courses in math and the arts along with an AP Seminar. All world language courses, except those in Latin and Arabic, are conducted exclusively in the target language. As a result, some students find the adjustment to language classes at Deerfield to be difficult, and our placement of new students may reflect that.

# Course Numbering Changes at Deerfield Academy for 2023-24

Deerfield has completely rehauled the course numbering system this year and one should not try to compare nor align it to the prior system. We have provided this additional information to give context to the changes that will be seen on our students' transcripts, and we hope it will help you better understand the nature of the total overhaul of our new course numbering system. The chart below outlines our graduation requirements, most advanced courses, and course abbreviation notes as they pertain to our new system. # New Course Numbering Rubric:

100-level typically for 9th and 10th graders or courses that are the first in a leveled sequence
200-level typically for 10th graders or courses that are the second in a leveled sequence
300-level typically for 10th - 12th graders or courses that are the third in a leveled sequence
400-level typically for 11th and 12th graders or courses that are the fourth in a leveled sequence
500- and 600-level courses that are the fifth or sixth in a leveled sequence

### Accelerated and Honors Courses

XX**5** are **accelerated** courses, moving students through additional material at a faster pace XX**9** are **honors** courses that encompass materials with greater depth and breadth

100 level = introductory (9th grade)

**200 level** = intermediate (9th/10th grade)

**300 level** = advanced intermediate (10th/11th grade)

**400 level** = advanced (11th/12th grade)

**500 level** = AP level/1st semester college level

**600 level** = post-AP/2nd semester college level

**700-800 level** = second year of college +

**xx3** = Honors level (includes Accelerated, Advanced) for some courses

## **Advanced Placement Examinations**

Students can choose to take an AP exam to demonstrate proficiency in a subject, even without officially taking an AP course. In the 2022-23 school year, 294 students sat for 680 AP exams. 93% of AP exams earned scores of 3 or higher:

Scores of 3 = 21%

Scores of 4 = 39%

Scores of 5 = 33%

# Disciplinary Disclosure Policy

Deerfield Academy's disciplinary system reflects the purposefully high behavioral and academic standards to which we hold our students. There are two components to reporting discipline—the institution and the student. Deerfield Academy has updated its institutional policy to the following: For as long as Deerfield Students are enrolled at the Academy, Deerfield will consider them in good standing and will not report internal disciplinary action to colleges, universities, and scholarship programs. If students withdraw pending discipline, are required to withdraw by the school, or otherwise officially separate from the school, Deerfield will communicate that change in status in a timely manner. As for the individual student, when an application asks whether a student has a disciplinary or academic infraction at any time during their high school career, the student will answer the question honestly.

Deerfield Academy maintains and benefits from a relationship with colleges, universities, and other educational programs that is based on openness and trust. For serious infractions, we reserve the right to communicate with colleges or other programs regardless of the particular application's requirements.

## # Pandemic Related Changes of Note

<u>For the 2020-2021 academic year</u>, Deerfield adopted a modular schedule wherein all students were enrolled in two year-long equivalent classes each trimester, totaling six courses per year. Remote instruction, both synchronous and asynchronous, was available for students who were unable to return to campus or were forced to quarantine. In order to accommodate the new schedule, accelerated science courses were not offered (Chemistry 1A, Biology 1A and Physics 1A) so students who ordinarily would have taken accelerated science courses were not given that option.
