- Adiga, Aravind. **The White Tiger** Balram Halwai surprisingly journeys from an impoverished village to great success in New Delhi.
- Alvarez, Julia. **How the Garcia Girls Lost Their Accents** Clashing against old-world restraints and tempting new freedoms, four sisters from Santo Domingo lead new lives in the U.S.
- Anaya, Rudolfo. **Bless Me, Ultima** With the help of his curandera, who cures with magic and herbs, Antonio comes of age in New Mexico.
- Atwood, Margaret. **Hag-Seed** Compare Shakespeare's **The Tempest** with a modern-day version set at a Canadian theater festival.
- Bhutto, Fatima. **The Shadow of the Crescent Moon** Three brothers in the tribal territories between Pakistan and Afghanistan feel the pull of competing loyalties.
- Boyne, John. **All the Broken Places** Gretel Fernsby's comfortable present can't obscure the horrors of her family's role in the German concentration camps.
- Bradbury, Ray. **Fahrenheit 451** Imagine a world without books—or the joy they can create.
- Brontë, Charlotte. **Jane Eyre** Young Jane survives hardships at a grim Yorkshire boarding school and makes an independent life as a governess to Mr. Rochester's ward. Then, problems arise.
- Brooks, Geraldine. **Horse** Race back and forth in time with the historical narrative about Lexington, a champion thoroughbred, and the men who rode and remembered him.
- Brown, Claude. **Manchild in the Promised Land** Harlem's vibrancy and racism's viciousness serve as backdrops for a young man's struggle to rise from a life of petty crime to an educated freedom.
- Brown, Daniel James. **The Boys in the Boat** Row to victory with the Americans in the 1936 Berlin Olympics.
- Brown, Natasha. **Assembly** A young woman in England finds that racial discrimination surrounds her in spite of her successes.
- Bryson, Bill. **A Walk in the Woods** Travel the 2,100-mile Appalachian Trail with a wonderful storyteller.
- Calvino, Italo. **The Baron in the Trees**. An Italian folktale in which a young nobleman climbs a tree and never comes down to earth.
- Chiang, Ted. **Exhalation** Travel through unexpected portals to imaginative realms with this science fiction master.
- Chung, Catherine. **The Tenth Muse** Seeking the beauty in numbers, a young mathematician strives to solve the Riemann hypothesis and finds herself also exploring World War II mysteries.
- Coelho, Paulo. **The Alchemist** Find your bond with this magical fable about a shepherd boy seeking his life's treasure.
- Doerr, Anthony. **All the Light We Cannot See** In the darkness of World War II, a blind French girl and a German boy find illumination in unexpected ways.
- Esquivel, Laura. **Like Water for Chocolate** Marvel at the magical realism in the story of a year in the life of Tita De la Garza.
- Gaines, Ernest. **A Lesson Before Dying** Two black men, a condemned criminal and a reluctant teacher, share lessons about dignity in this moving story set in Louisiana.
- García Márquez, Gabriel. **Chronicle of a Death Foretold** Why was a murder an entire town knew might happen not stopped?
- Guterson, David. **Snow Falling on Cedars** A murder mystery wraps around a larger story of lost identities because of World War II and the internment of Japanese Americans.
- Gyasi, Yaa. **Homegoing** The descendants of two half-sisters in colonial Ghana come to understand how slavery had shaped their unexpectedly intertwined destinies.
- Haddon, Mark. **The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time** A boy with autism sets out to solve the murder of a neighborhood dog and discovers other truths. Deerfield staged the play a few years ago.
- Hogan, Linda. **Power** Omishto, a teen member of the Taiga Tribe, seems stranded between tradition and change.

Horwitz, Tony. **One for the Road** Hitchhike with Horwitz down under across Australia.

Hudes, Quiara Alegria. **My Broken Language** This affecting memoir details the way the writer found her voice through music, cultural roots, and family.

Hunter, Megan. **The End We Start From** A young woman begins an odyssey to protect her child from rising seas in this thriller.

Janson, Trove. **The Summer Book** Janson captures the essence of summer in vignettes starring a young girl and her grandmother who explore their family's tiny island off the coast of Finland.

Junger, Sebastian. **The Perfect Storm** The struggle of seafarers against the power of nature has rarely been captured so vividly.

Kim, Juhea. **Beasts of a Little Land** An unlikely bond between a young girl sold into a courtesan school and an orphaned boy forms just as Korea struggles to claim independence in the early 20th-century.

Lansing, Alfred. **Endurance** After being shipwrecked in Antarctica and drifting 2,000 miles on ice floes for many months, Ernest Shackleton then sails more than 700 miles in a lifeboat to bring rescuers.

Lee, Min Jin. **Pachinko** The poignant saga of a Korean family unfolds in three countries—the divided Koreas and Japan.

Mamjudar, Megha. **A Burning** Three interwoven tales reflect the cultural and political complexities of life in modern-day India.

Mbue, Imbolo. **Behold the Dreamers** Young Cameroonian immigrants in New York experience cultural adaptation and loss.

McLemore, Anna-Marie. **When the Moon Was Ours** DA grad McLemore spins a fable involving family bonds and sexual identity.

McPhee, John. **The Headmaster** Examine the way Frank Boyden led a “school to greatness.”

McPhee, John. **The Survival of the Bark Canoe** Learn how a New Hampshire craftsman has kept a lost art alive.

Miller, Madeline. **Circe** Vexed by men and the gods, the enchantress strives to use her powers as she chooses.

Moore, Wes. **The Other Wes Moore** The lives of two men from an impoverished Baltimore neighborhood diverge. Why?

Obiano, Chigozie. **The Fishermen** The story of Cain and Abel is retold through the eyes of a 9-year-old boy in a Nigerian village.

Obrecht, Téa. **The Tiger's Wife** Myth and memory blend as a young doctor in an unnamed Balkan country searches for answers about the death of her grandfather, the man who had spun magnificent tales.

Onyebuchi, Tochi. **Riot Baby** A girl discovers that she can foresee the violent deaths of the young black men around her. Can she prevent those losses?

Philbrick, Nathaniel. **In the Heart of the Sea: The Tragedy of the Whaleship Essex.** If you've heard of **Moby-Dick**, you'll be fascinated by the events that inspired Herman Melville to write the classic novel.

Rivera, Gabby. **Juliet Takes a Breath** On a journey of self-discovery that winds from the Bronx to Portland, Oregon, Juliet Milagros Palante moves beyond a closeted life.

Russell, Karen. **St. Lucy's Home for Girls Raised by Wolves** The Everglades will never seem more magical or mystifying than after you read these stories.

Salinger, J.D. **The Catcher in the Rye** Through the mind and voice of the legendary Holden Caulfield, we join a modern-day odyssey as the expelled preppe navigates through a lonely weekend in Manhattan.

Shukla, Nikesh. **The Good Immigrant** Twenty-one writers reflect on being Black, Asian and minority ethnic in modern Britain.

Stevenson, Bryan. **Just Mercy** Watch as lawyers fight to free wrongly convicted inmates.

Trumbo, Dalton. **Johnny Got His Gun** Howard Zinn called this the best anti-war novel ever penned.

Van Pelt, Shelby. **Remarkably Bright Creatures** A grieving woman finds solace in an unlikely friendship with an octopus.

Walker, Karen Thompson. **Age of Miracles** With an apocalypse approaching, Julia still finds beautiful possibilities.

Walls, Jeannette. **The Glass Castle** Walls remembers an unconventional childhood, one touched by poverty and blessed by passion.

Williams, David. **When the English Fall** With society collapsing, will the Amish save the day or become victims themselves?
